| 1-Jul-25             | New Civil Penalties for Improper Use of De Minimis  | Under the One Big Beautiful Bill Act, any person who enters or facilitates entry of goods using Section 321 in violation of other customs laws will face:<br>- Up to \$5,000 for a first violation.<br>- Up to \$10,000 for each subsequent violation. | 20-Jan-25            | CBP NPRM – <i>De Minimis Eligibility for Certain Trade Measures</i>   | Proposed rule: exempt goods subject to Section 301, 201, or 232 trade measures from de minimis eligibility. Requires 10-digit HTSUS classification for certain de minimis shipments. Comments due by March 24, 2025. | 14-Jan-25            | CBP Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM) – <i>Enhanced Entry Process</i>  | Proposed amendments to over 30 regulations affecting ecommerce imports. Key change: creation of an “Enhanced Entry Process” ending the existing Entry Type 86 pilot. Requires additional data elements for de minimis shipments (country of shipment, product URL or foreign security scan, marketplace name).
